Procedures:

- 1. Gather students together. In the whole-class discussion, talk about what a character is.
- 2. Introduce Yertle and Mack, prior to reading the story.
- 3. Talk about how when we read stories, we can try to understand how the characters feel. We can also appreciate the varying qualities of the characters.
- 4. Tell students to use their critical thinking skills to try understand how Yertle and Mack were feeling in the story.
- 5. Read *Yertle the Turtle* to the students.
- 6. In whole class discussion, talk about how Mack felt. Talk about how Yertle felt.
- 7. In whole class discussion, discuss the qualities of both characters.
- 8. As a class, create a Venn Diagram comparing and contrasting the two characters.

Formative Observational Academic Assessment:

- Can the students determine the qualities of the characters?
- Can students compare and contrast the characters?
- Do students contribute to the creation of the Venn diagram?

Formative Observational SEL/P21 Assessment:

- Are students able to use critical thinking skills to determine take on the perspectives of the characters to determine the emotions of the characters?
- Do the students communicate effectively with the teacher and class?
- Do the students collaborate with classmates and the teacher to create a Venn diagram?
- Do the students naturally show empathy for Mack and an appreciation for the diversity of the characters?
